In our October 10 Tuesday Talk we learned about the Columbia Justice-in-Education initiative for incarcerated and formerly incarcerated men and women. The program has a major need for **mentors** and "**research assistants**." Inmates, even those enrolled in college credit bearing courses, are completely cut off from the internet and really need help in getting research resources. Released former-inmates need mentorship and guidance. There is room for teaching as well – but the mentorship and course assistance is an immediate need. I, personally, am still trying to figure out how keeping the internet – which of course can be exquisitely controlled and monitored by overseers – away from enrolled students (or inmates in general) is sensible policy.
